


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Synopsis: An unprecedented pandemic forces two fierce rivals to come face to face for the first time in over a decade, to close a deal for the most valuable substance on earth.

[Gerald Webb](#) directed, wrote and produced [STACKS](#). While the film marks Webb's directorial debut, the Daytime Emmy® Award nominated producer, actor and former casting executive is no stranger to filmmaking. He has produced 30+ films, cast 100+ films and has portrayed roles in over 150 films and television shows including: BARRY, LA'S FINEST, BULL, CRIMINAL MINDS: BEYOND BORDERS, IT'S ALWAYS SUNNY IN PHILADELPHIA, AGENT CARTER, 9-1-1 and many more.

In 2012, Gerald co-founded production company, DeInstitutionalized, LLC, with Christopher Ray. The company has produced and delivered films to partners including Netflix, Paramount, Syfy Network, Lifetime Network, ION Television, Saban, and Cinedigm. Gerald is also executive producing DeInstitutionalized's new scripted digital series, FraXtur. Prior to co-founding Deinstitutionalized, Gerald through his other company, Transformation Films, cast 100+ feature films including Syfy network's mega-hits SHARKNADO 1-3 and the first season of Syfy's series Z-NATION. Gerald worked his way up to the executive position of Director of Talent for The Asylum studios, producers of Sharknado and Z-NATION. He immediately went to work to transform the diversity of the studios' films. Under Gerald's stewardship, star name casting for The Asylum's films grew by 380% and diversity in casting across all categories more than doubled all in less than 5 years.

In 2019, Gerald was nominated for a Daytime Emmy® Award as a producer. In 2021 he was nominated for outstanding comedic writing and outstanding comedic direction for [STACKS](#) at the Micheaux Film Festival with [STACKS](#) winning outstanding comedic short at the festival. He's also garnered 7 Telly Awards in 2018 for Circus Kane, two in 2019 for 2nd Chance For Christmas and one for Assault On VA-33. Gerald is a member of the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences, The Screen Actors Guild (SAG/AFTRA) and the National Association of Television Program Executives (NATPE).

Currently Gerald can be seen on Fox's L.A.'s Finest and 9-1-1, as well as in Deinstitutionalized's upcoming action film ASSAULT ON VA-33, as Virgil on Studio71's The Shadow Diaries scripted podcast and in the hilarious music video for DROPPING DEUCES from the [STACKS](#) soundtrack.

You may recognize [Mark Christopher Lawrence](#) from his series regular role as Big Mike on NBC's CHUCK or from studio films like Pursuit of Happyness, Terminator II and Fear of a Black Hat or possibly from his Drybar standup comedy clips that have amassed over 18 million views. His 35+ year career hit a high note in 2021 with a Daytime Emmy® nomination for Outstanding Lead Actor in a Daytime Fiction Program for his gritty portrayal of Hector in **STACKS**! He was also nominated for Outstanding Comedic Actor at the Micheaux Film Festival where **STACKS** was nominated for outstanding directing, writing and took home the festival's prize for Outstanding Comedic Short. The veteran actor was the 2012 recipient of the San Diego Critics Circle's Craig Noel Award for Outstanding Actor of the Year and is a 2021 Pacific Southwest Regional Emmy® Award nominee for his narration of THE FLOURISH. Mark is an international headlining comedian that has worked with the likes of Sinbad, Jerry Seinfeld, Rodney Dangerfield, and Jeff Foxworthy.



This past holiday season Mark was an ensemble lead in the OWN network's "ONE FINE CHRISTMAS" and Deinstitutionalized Films' "2ND CHANCE FOR CHRISTMAS." Mark's television appearances include Black Jesus, recurring on PureFlix' Malibu Dan The Family Man, Disney Channel original movie LIFE IS RUFF, Lab Rats, Good Luck Charlie, Heroes, Weeds, My Name Is Earl, and Grounded for Life. He just released his hilarious talk show Pure Comedy on Pureflix.com. In addition to his leading man status, Mark also served as a consulting producer on **STACKS**.

Diahnna Nicole Baxter as MAGDALENA

[Diahnna Nicole Baxter](#) is a ruthless storyteller who addresses trauma as an opportunity for transformation through storytelling. She embodies this in her portrayal of Magdalena in **STACKS**. The Duke University graduate is a pioneer of the web. She co-created, co-wrote and starred in SATACRACY 88, the first web series to win an Emmy® Award. She also took home the People's Voice Webby Award for the series.



Diahnna has been on a multitude of television shows: The Terminalist, The Connors, Jane the Virgin, The Fosters and Tell Me Your Secrets and can be seen as Anne Jordan in the upcoming season of American Crime Story: The Impeachment.

She wrote, produced, and starred in her first short film, Cowboy's Girl and her solo directorial debut, Epigenetics, is hitting the festival circuit. Beyond creating stories, Diahnna embodies the transformation of body, mind, and spirit as a certified Kundalini Yoga Teacher and transformational coach.

Calvin Winbush as TY

Director of Photography [Thomas Hennessy](#): The Chicago native spent 11 years in the US Navy and served in Iraq in 2005. Upon moving to Los Angeles, Thomas attended Columbia College Hollywood, graduating Magna Cum Laude with a BFA in Cinema Arts. He wrote and directed the feature film ANOTHER TIME, starring Justin Hartley and Arielle Kebbel. Thomas has served as a cinematographer and in the camera department for over 50 films and TV shows. He is the Cinematographer for the documentary BROTHERS AT WAR II, directed by Jake Rademacher and Executive Produced by Gary Sinise, and the feature film 20 MINUTES scheduled for release in 2020.

Editor [Jeff Murphy](#): Daytime Emmy® winning producer, Jeff Murphy, is a member of the Motion Picture Editors Guild and Television Academy. When Webb and the song's producer, billboard dance chart topping remixer, Knappy, couldn't get through the song without stopping to laugh, Webb decided he had to shoot a video for the song and have it play during the end credit sequence of STACKS. The music video for Dropping Deuces is purposely silly and downright slapstick funny. Webb hopes this will disarm the audience enough for them to really look in the mirror at where they may be responsible for hoarding toilet paper too! "When I felt utterly ridiculous on camera while filming the DROPPING DEUCES music video, I knew it was hitting the exact prescription of laughter so many of us need during this terrible pandemic" – Webb said.

Mark Christopher Lawrence talks about his 2021 Daytime Emmy nomination for 'Lead Actor'

Veteran actor and comedian Mark Christopher Lawrence chatted with Digital Journal's Markos Papadatos about his 2021 Daytime Emmy nomination for "\$STACK\$."

Lawrence is one of five nominees that is vying for the 2021 Daytime Emmy Award for "Outstanding Daytime Fiction Program." He stars in the show as Hector. "Playing Hector was different for me," he said. "It was a really dark character for me, and I believe that I am a better dramatic actor than I am a comedic actor even though my career has mostly been in comedy."

On receiving an Emmy nod for this role, he said, "That felt pretty good. I earned a regional Emmy nod earlier in the month for another project, so to be up for a Daytime Emmy is really exciting."

He co-produced the show "\$STACK\$" with director, writer, and producer Gerald Webb, and Meredith Thomas served as a supervising producer. "Working with Gerald was fantastic. He knew what he wanted to see," he said. "The good thing is that he had trust in my abilities. He allowed me to ad-lib and a couple of good moments came out of that."

Lawrence praised Meredith Thomas as a "beautiful and sweet-spirited woman." "I hope to have a friendship with her for years to come. To be able to co-produce with Meredith and Gerald was a blessing," he said.

For young and aspiring actors, he encouraged them to "work hard on their craft." "When you get to a certain level everybody is good. At that point, it's about bringing something different to the table and being solid in your work ethic. Just be the best that you can be," he said.

On the title of the current chapter of his life, he said, "Survival to Rebound." "I am surviving the pandemic. I lost all of my work last year but now I am rebounding and getting back out there in a different way," he said.

Lawrence defined the word success as "being happy in his day-to-day life." "If I can be happy in my day-to-day, then I can be successful," he said.

For fans and viewers, he concluded about "\$STACK\$," "Don't take yourself too seriously. A lot of times, people form opinions about what they see and then it's hard to let go of the original thought so don't take yourself too seriously."


\$STACK\$ is a film that is very much of its time. With the world still dealing with the global pandemic, the short movie takes a look at a very particular problem associated with everything that is going on. The film is the directorial feature debut from Gerald Webb, who is best known as a producer and actor with over one hundred and fifty credits to his name. While watching the lead up to the Covid-19, Los Angeles Stay at Home

mandatory quarantine, Webb quickly penned the screenplay, cast, crewed up and shot \$STACK\$ all in a 48-hour window just as Los Angeles and our world were all shutting down due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

Set in a neon-lit car park, two local gang members are anxiously awaiting the arrival of their suppliers. Without the re-up they know their businesses in trouble. Tensions are high as they wait, hoping the lateness of the suppliers' arrival is not a bad sign. Just as it looks bleak, A car draws up, the rival Boss gets out the car and the deal is on.

The film uses assumptions and stereotypes to reinforce its message and subvert audience expectations. The conversations and the way the actors present themselves indicate a certain type of drama, especially involving black gang members. The language including certain trigger words leads you to believe that what you are seeing is a tried and tested formula for storytelling. The high production values and quality of actor on-screen just add to the overall feeling. It is a clever and confident debut that pays off superbly due to the meticulous lead-in. The film, at only seven minutes in length, boasts an atmospheric soundtrack and as a nice surprise a theme song that fits nicely with the drama on screen.

The film debuted on the 12th of May and you can watch it below. The theme song, Dropping Dueces is available on youtube and all music streaming sites.

Movie Short Review: 'Stack\$'

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Greetings again from the darkness. The set-up is a familiar one. Two tough guys, armed with weapons, snap at each other about the meeting that is about to go down. Tensions are high. Taking place in an underground garage for privacy, and as the SUV approaches, the two men bow up – looking ready for action. We've seen this encounter many times, whether it's a drug deal, a weapons deal, or the exchange of a hostage for bounty.

Writer-director-producer Gerald Webb gives us the familiar, but with a twist. Two rival bosses meet face-to-face for the exchange. Magdalena (Diahnna Nicole Baxter) and Hector (Mark Christopher Lawrence) may have had previous business dealings, but this transaction requires both parties to confirm.

Mr. Webb delivers a clever tongue-in-cheek commentary on the current pandemic, and it's one that proves quite relatable to most everyone. Written, filmed, and produced quickly prior to the mandated shutdown of Los Angeles, the film provides a nice 7 minute escape that includes a closing rap song "Dropping Deuces" noting the COVID-19 challenges, and paying tribute to the heroic essential workers. On a side note, it includes some of the cheesiest looking "money" you'll likely ever see on screen – just an added element of lightness.

Webb is a former casting executive for Sharknado 1-3 and Syfy's Z-Nation. He has appeared in over 100 film and television shows, cast over 150 films, has produced 35+ films and the upcoming series FraXtur, was the American DJ Association's 1998 nightclub DJ of the year and is the cofounder of DelInstitutionalized Films. While watching the lead up to the Covid-19, Los Angeles Stay at Home mandatory quarantine, Webb quickly penned the screenplay, cast, crewed up and shot \$STACK\$ all in a 48 hour window just as Los Angeles and our world were all shutting down due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

\$STACK\$ was produced by Gerald Webb and associate produced by Mark Christopher Lawrence and Meredith Thomas (A Christmas in Vermont, The Wrong Boy Next Door and creator of FYC Independents).

With Film and TV Production hanging in the balance, it is always inspiring to hear of somebody's own initiative and inventiveness winning through to create something that will certain endure and demonstrate their clear and evident talent.

The brand-new short \$TACK\$ takes a familiar style of filmmaking to create a very funny pay-off. Additionally, it is amazing how something was conceived so quickly.

Film And TV Now was delighted to speak with director Gerald Webb about the project – and he also shared some pointers about how to create and make films during these challenging times.



FILM AND TV NOW: This is a very ingenious short which takes the tradition of a gang warfare narrative and subverts it to deliver a very honest and real message at the end, both in the short and the song **DROPPING DEUCES**. How long did it take to put together?

GERALD WEBB: We had to be super quick because I was pretty sure a mandatory quarantine was going to be ordered any day. Basically, from conception to completion of principle photography was a 63-hour window. I got the idea for the story around 11pm on Saturday night and quickly wrote the script.

Slept for 4 hours, the whole time my brain churning with ideas. I woke up at 5am, did a round of revisions to the script and sent it to Mark Christopher Lawrence to read. By 10am he got back to me and asked, "when are we shooting?" Over the next few hours I made calls and put our mini crew in place starting with the DP, Thomas Hennessy.

Next were calls to an amazing cast of actors, all of who I had worked with previously. Monday was spent confirming our location, securing props, craft services, remotely viewing wardrobe photos etc. We shot that Tuesday night. We wrapped at 2am Wednesday morning and L.A. went into quarantine 46 hours later.

We slowed down a bit for post-production which took 5.5 weeks with everyone working part time and remotely from home.



FTVN: During the end credits there is a caption that talks of how the crew worked within key COVID-19 Health and Safety guidelines. Given the state of production at the moment as it has effectively been shut down, although there are reports that production has resumed with stringent conditions, what pointers could you give other filmmakers and people who want to make films in this period of enforced lockdown?

GW: I was fanatical about having hand sanitizer readily available, access to hand washing, pre-cleaning all common touch surfaces etc. I went thorough and cleaned our entire location myself a few hours before our call time than had crew members clean doorknobs, elevator

buttons etc every hour or so. All of our crafty was individually wrapped food and snacks. Lunch was individually packaged meals.

Mark Christopher Lawrence said when get go to the building, he hit the elevator button and was dismayed to find out it was wet. Then a second later he realized it was probably Lysol from the smell!

On **\$STACKS** we actually had a star name cast member who called me the day before we were filming and said he had woken up feel out of sorts but had hoped it would pass. Unfortunately, as the day went on he developed a slight cough and while he felt he could get through the shoot, I had to make the responsible choice to recast in order to protect him and the entire cast and crew.

The good news is he fine and it wasn't Covid related and our cast and crew were all kept safe.

For other filmmakers, here are some things I'd suggest:

1. **You take it seriously. Make sure everyone on your crew takes it seriously. If anyone doesn't replace them.**
2. **Have a formal set of health and safety guidelines. Make sure each cast and crew member get a copy and acknowledges they will follow the guidelines.**
3. **Have a dedicated sanitizing crew member(s) whose sole job is to keep common areas super sanitized and to remind people to practice good use of PPE.**
4. **Only have individually packaged food and crafty items on site. No buffet style meals or snacks.**
5. **Every hour rotate your cast and crew for quick trips to wash their hands.**
6. **Plan for delays due to implementing and maintaining Covid preventive practices.**
7. **Err on the side of caution and always make the tough decisions in favor of safety. This sounds easy but I guarantee your resolve will be tested sooner than you think.**
8. **As much as possible segregate your team members and limit the size of interacting groups as a way to limit as much potential cross contamination as you can between set, base camp, etc.**

This list will continue to grow.

FTVN: Tell us about your cast.

GW: I think their performance speak for themselves.

The Emmy winning Diahnna Nicole Baxter who plays bosschick Magdalena is just plain fierce. She and I played husband and wife in the feature **A HOUSE IS NOT A HOME** and had the most real and raw argument on screen I've ever been a part of. Crew members

came running to set thinking we had an actual fight! She was my first choice for Magdalena and didn't disappoint.

Mark Christopher Lawrence is the most under used talent in L.A. He's been a series regular on 4 or 5 shows and has been in classic movies like Fear of a Black Hat, Pursuit of Happyness and his stand-up clips get millions of views. Most people see him as a great comedic actor but I think he's an even better dramatic actor. The power dynamic between him and Diahnna was exactly what I saw when writing. Their performances real give the feel of a long and complicated history in every moment they are on screen together.

Calvin Winbush plays Ty and just has a great natural feel and casualness in his performances. His stillness and grounding really helped ramp up the tension in the film.

Tarnue Massaquoi and I took acting classes together years ago. As Reub he brought an intensity that really raised the stakes right from the start of the film. You sense his worry and it can't help but make you wonder and worry yourself.

Jadarrel Belser quietly matched Tarnue's intensity. His no-nonsense, everything is cool-unless you screw it up, demeanor also really pushed the tension for the audience. With one word, you knew he was all about business.

Jamie Burton-Oare brought a raw and unrefined quality to the character of Jordan. That rawness was a wildcard and also kept the audience on edge. She and I played husband and wife in a play 7 or 8 years ago.



FTVN: Tell us about your production team.

GW: We had a skeleton production team for two reasons:

1. We shot this on a pocket change budget with almost everyone volunteering their time because they believed in the project. For which I am forever grateful.

2. We wrapped shooting just 46 hours prior to L.A. County's "Safer at Home" quarantine decree going into effect. We wanted to be responsible by limiting our total crew size and some people that normally would have jumped in had already gone into isolation.

Let's be clear this was a bunch of very talented people who generously loaned me their time and talent to collectively create **\$TACK\$**. Besides me, the crew consisted of the DP (Thomas Hennessy), the 1st AC/focus puller/still photographer (Kasee Shambora), the one man grip electric team and camera assistant (Curtis Davis), the sound mixer (Alex Hutchinson), catering set up, lock downs, etc. were handled by an associate producer (Meredith Thomas) and we had one production assistant (Yolanda Edme).

Offsite in Buffalo, NY the production coordinator (Sam Qualiana) helped prep the call sheet and other details in our super quick pre-production. With the exception of Yolanda, I've worked with every one of these crew members numerous times but usually with all of us filling other positions. Notice: no 1st ad, no 2nd ad, a 1 man G&E team, 2 man Camera team, no vanities etc. Everyone was pulling double and triple duty.

For post we added several members, who all worked remotely: editor and post supervisor (Jeff Murphy), the composer and VFX artist (Knappy) in Delaware and the music video editor (Ken Prieto) and Public Relations by Catherine Lyn Scott for London Flair Public Relations.

It was the first time I chose to direct a film (not counting b-unit directing on a few previous movies), one key thing for me was to make sure working on **\$TACK\$** was also an opportunity for each of the crew members that graciously offered to help me out. For example, Thomas the DP loves the crime genre but rarely gets to DP that type of shot. Curtis generally works as a 1st AC but is transitioning to grip work and welcomed the opportunity to switch positions on **\$TACK\$**.

FTVN: The music plays a vital part in the film. Tell us about your working relationship with Knappy.

GW: Knappy and I go back 20+ years. We've worked on countless project together during that time. Long ago we were in a rap group together called 1 A.D., I was a groomsman at his wedding and he did the score for our film **A HOUSE IS NOT A HOME**.

He's a great music producer and his remixes for major artists have topped the Billboard dance charts. Because of our long history, it's really easy to communicate my artistic thoughts to Knappy. I also know he's going to elevate what I communicate to him and ultimately make the project better. It's really rewarding to be able to work with old friends and give them an opportunity to shine and showcase their work.

In the end I benefitted more than I gave! Knappy did a great job on the score and on the song **DROPPING DEUCES**. He also did the visual effects for the film. And if you didn't think there were any VFX in the film, it's because Knappy did such a great job with them.



FTVN: The film is getting an online premiere on YouTube and other platforms. What are your hopes for the short and song in terms of your objectives and where you want it to play?

GW: I've already won. **\$STACKS** came out better than I could have ever hoped my first project as director and writer would turn out. It's a film I can show anyone and be proud of it. I just wanted to get it out there during this critical time in our history for audiences, people and our society to hopefully be impacted by. I'm open and curious as to how far and wide it could reach, only time will tell.

It will definitely have a festival life whenever we can have film festivals again. I also hope it will open doors to more projects as a director possibly opportunities with some of network and studio's director development programs.

Dropping Deuce was really an after-thought. As we were waiting for edits and revisions, Knappy sent over a beat he thought might work over the credit sequence. I listened to it on loop and got the idea for a crazy rap song. I started writing to the beat and thought my ability to wrap had disappeared!

The track was about 130 beats per minute and I just couldn't rap fast enough. I took a break (and almost gave up) to look at a tutorial for creating specialty shots with a gimbal and came across a music video that was completely shot on the pocket Osmo gimbal. I loved the beat from the song and it was much slower at 90ish beats per minute.

I started writing dropping deuces over that beat and the verse just flowed out effortlessly. I recorded a rough vocal and sent it to Knappy who then produced the beat for Dropping Deuces which is a much better fit what I was able to write. The song is built for the internet for people to have a quick chuckle at and hopefully share with their friends so add it to your Spotify playlists!

FTVN: How long did it take to shoot?

GW: Our one shoot day was 7.5 hours from call time to wrap.

FTVN: The film does have the basis for a feature length parody in the tradition of **I'M GONNA GIT YOU SUCKA'** which parodied the Blaxploitation films like **SHAFT** and **COFFY**. Is this something you would like to do as a follow-on feature if all gets back to a more reasonable way of production?

GW: **I'M GONNA GIT YOU SUCKA'** is one of my favorites. There are scenes in that movie that are flat out hysterical and there is definitely some Antonio Fargas inspiration in the **DROPPING DEUCES** music video performance! I'm flattered by the comparison though I feel like the films are fundamentally different from one another. At its core, **\$TACK\$** is a drama while **I'M GONNA GIT YOU SUCKA'** is a comedy. They're similarity is that they both make strong social statements.

But I do have an idea for a spoof movie that involves hip hop, poking fun at classic urban films with some major modern twists. It's not really a feature length version of **\$TACK\$** but Hector, Magdalena and the gang would definitely make an appearance.

I've also thought about doing four other short films and packaging them with **\$TACK\$** and the **DROPPING DEUCES** video as stand-alone episodes in a variety style web series. At least two of the episodes would be animated including one retelling a true a greatly exaggerated story of my cousin getting a well-deserved whooping in the 1980s called The Ballad of Stephanie Parks and the second retelling a crank call I made imitating Ving Rhames to a writer friend.



FTVN: Given that films and television are even more important in terms of helping people and keeping them entertained through lock-down, what are the most important things for you when you are creating work like this short and the music video?

GW: In the past I've worked on a lot of formulaic projects like Christmas films, sci-fi films, MOW thrillers etc. all of which have a place as an escape for audiences. But as a director the most important thing for me is: what is the base message behind the project and how can I guide, mentor, compel or even manipulate the audience to see, feel, experience and hopefully embrace that central message.

\$TACK\$, at its core, is a film that allows me to hold a mirror up to every viewer and every member of our society offering them the opportunity to see the best and the worst in themselves.

Making films is not easy so I want something that on a base level compels me to keep pushing through the tough times and to continue striving for ways to have it connect for the audience. Our world learns so much through art. I have a sincere reverence for the gateway art can be to communication and understanding on an interpersonal level as well as on a grand scale.

To me that is the director's most sacred duty and partly why I was scared of directing for so long.

FTVN: Overall, how are you and your production team coping with the lock-down in general?

GW: Everyone is restless and worried about their finances, health and when we can all get back to normal. But overall, they all seem in fairly good spirits. My sleep was completely jacked up for two months and just recently got back to normal.

Having **\$TACK\$** to work on actually kept me busy and a bit distracted in a good way during this quarantine. In a way I feel exhausted from all of the work on the film but at the same time I've been cooped up at home for two months and just want to get back to work, see some friends and go to a restaurant after wrap.

Most of the team has done something to keep busy but I can sense a tenseness and worry eating at most of them.

FTVN: Finally, what are you most proud of about the film?

GW: I'm proud of everyone's contributions to the film. From the actors to the DP to the editor and Knappy, everyone across the board. They all really did a fantastic job and the film greatly benefitted from each of their contributions.

In addition, I'm happy that the underlying message I intended for the film is connecting with audiences. It's hard to get people to watch short films but when we can get someone to watch **\$TACK\$** they are all taken by the drama and unexpected consequences of the film. I think that's the whole point.

Sometimes, you have to laugh.

That may seem like odd advice to give at this moment in history because, right now, there's a lot of people who are convinced that we'll never share a joke or a smile again. They look at the news about the spread of COVID-19 and the empty grocery store shelves and everything else that's going on and they say to themselves, "Laughter is dead." Of course, what they're failing to understand is that often, it's laughter and comedy that help people survive tough times. It's much easier to deal with a problem if you laugh at it first. Sacrificing one's sense of humor is the first step towards surrender and surrendering is not what we, as a people, are about.

The 7 and a half-minute short film, *\$tack\$*, opens with a familiar cinematic situation. Two men are in an underground garage, standing next to their car and waiting for someone else to arrive. They exchange a few words, the type of tough guy talk that we've heard in countless crime films. Both of them are armed. Both of them know that the situation is serious. Both of them are ready for whatever happens.

Another vehicle pulls up and more people get out. More guns are displayed. A sell is being made. The second group of people is assured that they're getting the best, "pure white."

As I said, it's a situation that we've seen in countless crime films but this one has a humorous COVID-19 inspired twist, one that I will not spoil here. It's a clever little twist, though and it's one to which everyone — and I do mean everyone — will be able to relate. Making his directorial debut, Gerald Webb plays the action straight, even when *\$tack\$*'s main joke is revealed. The audience may laugh but, to the characters in the film, there's nothing more important than the business transaction being conducted in that underground garage. And really, who can blame them?

A rap and a music video play over the end credits, one that not only details the hardships of living in the COVID-19 era but which also pays tribute to all of the essential workers on the front lines, which is a nice touch. If nothing else, it'll make you feel better about the times that we're living than watching a hundred "this is the new normal" brand name commercials will.

Be sure to track down *\$tack\$*. It'll make you laugh and that's an important thing right now.

While watching the lead up to the Covid-19, Los Angeles Stay at Home mandatory quarantine, Webb quickly penned the screenplay, cast, crewed up and shot *STACKS* all in a 48-hour window just as Los Angeles and our world were all shutting down due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

INTERVIEW WITH GERALD WEBB FILM MAKER, ACTOR, PRODUCER AND DJ.

Gerald Webb is a Daytime Emmy nominated producer, actor, director, writer and former casting executive and DJ. The Philadelphia/South Jersey native has been involved in the entertainment business since he was break dancing as a kid and DJing as a teenager. From those humble beginnings and being mentored by Jam Master Jay of RUN DMC, Gerald has gone on to produce 35+ films as a partner at Deinstitutionalized, LLC, cast 100+ films including Sharknado 1-3, Syfy network's television series Z-Nation, and has appeared as an actor in over 150 films and television shows including BARRY, L.A.'s FINEST, PLAYERS and IT'S ALWAYS SUNNY IN PHILADELPHIA. \$STACK\$ and DROPPING DEUCES bring Gerald's career full circle bridging his musical past and filmmaker present.

Pump It Up Magazine caught up with film maker, Actor, rapper, and DJ Gerald Webb and asked him about his 7 minute short film \$stack\$!

1. WHAT MADE YOU PURSUE FILM MAKING?

I think it's in you or it's not. I just got to a point where despite being a very successful DJ, I wasn't fulfilled and did a t of soul searching for what I really wanted. I did a lot of soul searching, read books, took personal development classes. Acting, film making and moving to L.A. kept popping up in my thoughts. I finally decided to choose whether to go for with everything I had OR to give up the idea of pursuing film making forever and never say would of, could of or should of in the future. When I realized I couldn't give it up completely, what had always be in me, made the choice for me.

2. WHAT ROADBLOCKS DID YOU FACE WHEN YOU WERE STARTING OUT?

Sometimes I feel like I ran into EVERY road block. The biggest one early was just not knowing what I was doing while thinking I did. I had to really humble myself and approach the industry from a place of knowing nothing in order to start finding my way. Money was also a big obstacle.

It takes a lot more money than most people think to start your acting business- photo shoots, head shot printing, memberships to casting sites, acting classes etc. Access is also a big roadblock that doesn't really go away. You get into one room and there you see another door, and another with each level you rise through.

3. WHAT IS YOUR GREATEST ACHIEVEMENT TO DATE?

To have the opportunity to pursue my dreams and make art. Awards come and go but not everyone is fortunate enough to be able to choose to do what they love. It's a rollercoaster with many ups and lots of downs but being able to pursue it every day is an amazing achievement for me and just about any one.

4. HOW DID YOU COME UP WITH THE IDEA FOR YOUR FILM \$STACK\$?

I was watching the early stages of the Covid-19 toilet paper hoarding and was really upset by the selfishness and complete lack of concern shown by some for other human beings. Rather than get into a fight at a retail store, I tried to find a better way to express my frustration and frankly anger with what I was seeing materialize in front of me. As I got home and stewed, the idea for \$STACK\$ came to me.

5. CAN YOU TELL US MORE ABOUT YOUR UPCOMING PROJECT(S)?

I'm currently writing a PSA type project inspired by seeing the beautiful response to the murder of George Floyd. Seeing this generation stop the world by standing up against racial inequality was beautiful despite the tragedies that created the backlash.

I'm also developing a film based on black voting rights and the abolition movement in the late 1800s. And at Deinstitutionalized Films, my business partner and I are in post-production on the digital series FraXtur, a post apocalyptic coming of age story and the film ASSAULT ON VA-33 starring Michael Jai White, Mark Dacacos, Sean Patrick Flanery and Abigail Hawk.

6. CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT THE GREATEST MOMENT IN YOUR FILM CAREER?

I'm not sure but it might be the moment I truly realized I was a professional and could work with anyone at any level in this industry. I was working as an actor on the film Zombie Apocalypse with Ving Rhames, Taryn Manning, Lesley Ann Brandt and Eddie Steeples.

I had a death scene and after we wrapped, I was about to head back to base camp and Ving pulled me aside. He then said, "that was really nice Webb. That was really nice work." I had given up my DJing career, moved to Los Angeles and worked for 5 years to be a 'professional actor'. To hear a legend like that validate all of the hard work that was put into that performance was a key moment for my confidence and my career.

7. DO YOU THINK IT IS ESSENTIAL TO GO TO A FILM INSTITUTE IN ORDER TO BECOME A SUCCESSFUL FILM MAKER?

It is absolutely not essential. There is no right way to become a filmmaker. School and institutes can be really helpful but just making a film with whatever gear and team you can put together can be invaluable.

9. IF YOU GOT THE OPPORTUNITY TO REMAKE A CLASSIC, WHICH ONE WOULD YOU GO FOR?

I'd remake the TV series M.A.S.H. or Scarface.

10. ANY ADVICE TO YOUNG FILM MAKERS STARTING OUT?

Be prepared to work ridiculously hard. Seriously, you will have to work 300 times harder than you think you will to be successful in this industry. It's uber-competitive but that doesn't mean everyone is against you. You're really only competing against yourself. Learn everything you can about the film industry, it will come in handy.

Believe in yourself but also humble yourself.

Remember you have to develop all sides of your filmmaking business technical, artistic, political, financial etc. The more you know the better off you'll be. .





PRODUCTION NOTES

1. Late on a Saturday night, Gerald Webb had an idea for a short film inspired by what he was seeing happen in the early stages of the covid-19 pandemic. Knowing a quarantine was imminently coming, he decided to write and shoot **STACKS** as quickly as possible. Amazingly, **68 hours** later and just 46 hours prior to Los Angeles' Safer at Home Covid-19 quarantine order going into effect, principal photography on **STACKS** was wrapped.
2. Director Gerald Webb wrote and performed the song [DROPPING DEUCES](#) from **STACKS**' credit sequence. The idea for the song came to Gerald why he was waiting for the second cut of **STACKS** to come from the editor. Gerald and the film's composer, Delaware based remixer, Knappy, who produced the song, were in a rap group together in the late 1990s called One a.d. They remotely recorded vocals for DROPPING DEUCES with Gerald in Los Angeles and Knappy in Delaware.
3. Diahnna Nicole Baxter previously played Director Gerald Webb's wife in the film A HOUSE IS NOT A HOME. They were both nominated for best actor and actress respectively by the Burbank International Film Festival for their performances in the film.
4. In 2006 at the request of a friend, **STACKS** star, Mark Christopher Lawrence took a 5-minute phone call from a stranger seeking advice on starting a career in Hollywood. That stranger was Gerald Webb. The two have since formed a close friendship and Gerald has been able to pay Mark's kindness back by bringing him onto numerous projects.
5. Diahnna Nicole Baxter won the first Emmy® Award given out for broadband content as a producer on the digital series SATACRACY-88.
6. As a precaution due to the threat of the Covid-19 pandemic, **STACKS** was shot without the following crew members: 1st AD, 2nd AD, script supervisor, production designer, set dressers, hair or make-up artists. The G&E team was 1 person, camera team 2 people and total on set crew count was 7 people consisting of the director, DP, focus puller/1st AC, 1 G&E member, sound mixer, associate producer and 1 production assistant.
7. There are 9 "easter eggs" in **STACKS** foretelling what's to come. Most people watch the film and don't catch any of them! Gerald purposely placed them in the film daring the audience to figure out the twist in **STACKS**. Did you see them? SPOILER ALERT!!!!
 Visual:
 - a- The car license plates in **STACKS** are from Gerald's state of birth Pennsylvania and each has secret message if you pay close attention. One says "P8PR2P" (Paper 2p) and the seconds says "T01L3T5" (toilets)!
 - b- The logo on the center of the front grill of the SUV in stacks says "DIVOC" that's COVID spelled backwards!
 - c- The aerial shot at 0:07 is actually played backwards. There is a car backing away from the intersection and a person crossing the street backwards. Gerald decided to use this shot as a metaphor for some of the "backwards" actions he's seen from people during the Covid-19 pandemic.
 - d- Reub played by Tarnue Massaquoi is wearing a scarf/ face covering / MASK around his neck the entire film.
 Audio- there are several lines in the film that reference what is to come and the Covid-19 pandemic:
 - e- "Our whole territory goes down the TOILET" at 0:40.
 - f- "Let's ROLL" at 01:10. (Toilet paper rolls)
 - g- "Keep your DISTANCE" at 02:25. (social distancing)
 - h- "DON'T TRY TO SQUEEZE ME Hector, first I see the product" at 02:41.
 - i- "Pure, CHINA (origin of Covid-19), WHITE" at 02:51. (China origin of Covid-19, white/pure toilet paper)
 - j- "This oughtta keep you FLUSH" at 03:10.
8. At the opening film, over the aerial shot of the nighttime Philadelphia skyline, there is a credit: "A Gerald Webb jawn". The title pays homage to Gerald's birth city of Philadelphia. Jawn is a decades old but highly popular slang term in Philly that can replace almost any noun and in this case it replaces "film".
